Artist has gap to fill in portrait project

ARTIST and former Imberhorne School student is looking for one final East Grinstead resident to complete her townspeople Hall of Fame.

If you are a regular around the town, you may recognise some faces on the wall of the Jubilee Community Centre until November 30, including Imberhorne School head teacher Martin Brown, bookshop owner John Pye, Paralympic sportsman Doran Scotson and mother Linda, and Sir Nicholas Soames MP.

But alongside the eight faces who according to artist Sheri Gee have a "special connection" to the town – there is currently a blank canvas waiting to be filled.

Charlwood Road resident Sheri began work on her Art Trail portrait project earlier this year, but wanted to give a random member of the public the chance to appear alongside the well-known faces, by inviting them to enter them-selves or a loved one into a prize draw.

Once the exhibition ends, the portrait is theirs to keep.

Sheri, 39, who works in London three days a week as an art dir-

ector, said: "I wanted to offer anyone the chance to have a portrait painted. Commissioning a portrait is probably not something people would normally consider doing and it's not something that everyone can afford. I'm excited to meet the sitter, to find out a bit about them and give them or their family something to treasure and $hopefully \ pass\ down\ to\ future\ gen-$

The portrait project, which she describes as "six months of work," began when Sheri approached a list of people she wanted to paint from a photograph graph.

One such person was Linda Scotson, mother of aspiring Paralympic athlete Doran Scotson and founder of the Advanced Centre

for the Scotson Technique which helps improve the lives of children with brain injuries and breathing problems

"I was so touched and encouraged when Sheri approached me," Linda said. "She said she knew of the half marathons Doran runs for charity despite suffering severe brain injuries at birth. She had seen him in newspapers and knew what he had achieved. I'm just so glad she's understood what we're trying to achieve – to inspire other families and the world to see what is possible. I thought the portraits really captured the spirit of that."

The Art Trail project was offi-

cially opened by the East Grinstead Bookshop owner John Pye, at a ceremony in Chequer Mead's Greenstede Gallery on

John got the attention of artist Sheri while the Art Trail group were meeting in the upstairs room of the bookshop once a month in the 18-month run-up to the launch. Sheri took a photograph of him and a few months later she was showing him a first draft of his portrait.

Despite being convinced his

portrait was "scaring small children", John said he thought Sheri had done a fantastic job. He said: "I'm very impressed by

anvone who can draw, but it's a special skill to capture someone's likeness. Sheri has her own distinctive style. I think it's a very good likeness and I'm very flattered to be chosen. But my daughter did say to me 'Dad, why did they choose you?'

What with working in London three days a week and caring for two small children, Sheri wishes she had time to paint more people.

She said: "Peter Andre would have been fab, but it didn't quite work out. And being a commuter I regret not adding one of my fellow train travellers. I'd have liked to have added someone who has commuted for 20-plus years."

A council spokesman said: "At present, one set of hands is disconnected from the clock; the other side is functioning as per normal. The problem is a mechanical one which has been diagnosed by our contractors and we have placed an order that will enable us to replace the faulty part.

"Sadly, we have had to source this part from Europe as there is no longer a UK supplier who provides these very specialised items. But of course, this being August, it means our supplier has shut down for the summer holidays and we are going to have to wait until next month before delivery."
